


1) First Campus – Trinity Church Schoolhouse (1754-1756)






The fire that broke out in the New Free School in New York City in the early hours of February 23, 1750, destroyed that recently completed building, and as depicted in this commemorative scene the blaze was spread by flying cinders to the steeple of Trinity Church, where happily it was extinguished. (The engraved date is "1749/50" because two calendars were then in use.) The reward money received by Andrew Gautier, a chair maker, for his part in saving the church apparently went toward this bowl made by Adrian Bancker and inscribed AGE for Andrew and his wife Elizabeth.



Birthplace of Columbia College - 1754


Rector Street – Approximately 25 feet from Alexander Hamilton's Grave

Plaque from Columbia University's 200th Anniversary in 1954 – Likely Stolen in the 1970s






View of 49th Street

"The new location of the College is a delightful one ... The old Asylum buildings have been altered somewhat, repaired, and greatly improved. The two wings have been separated from the main building. The east wing is occupied by the Chapel and the extensive Library of the College; the center [U-shaped [structure] for the recitation rooms and the residence of President King; and the west wing for the residence of some of the College Professors. A beautiful lawn slopes from the College southward down to 49th Street, and is ornamented by some fine old trees. This will be for the present the main entrance to the College, but as soon as the more extensive grounds northward to 50th Street can be graded, laid out, and properly embellished, the principal entrance will be in that direction. The site is on a commanding eminence, affording an extensive and pleasant view."

"That part of the city is still quite new, and the hand of improvement is visible in all directions. 'Potters Field' is within a stone's throw, and we are sorry to say the ends of rows of coffins, filled with the bones of the unknown dead, are still to be seen protruding from the bank of earth left by the cutting through of the Fourth Avenue. The College will probably remain in its present location only six or eight years, or until the new College buildings to be erected by the Trustees shall be completed."



This picture is taken from 49th Street though Columbia College seems to have used 50th street as their official location during this period.





















THE FATE OF LEGENDRE.

ADRIEN MARIE LEGENDRE was called to account on the college campus by the Columbia Sophomores on the night of Monday, June 5. It was a solemn affair. At 10 p.m., by the Worth monument at Madison Square, the Sophomores assembled with their friends and sympathizers, and formed in a long procession. They were attired in Roman togas and the usual Greek trousers; they were decorated with sashes of silk and extemporized head-gear; they marched to the inspiring measures of a brass band; and at their head was the unfortunate "Legendre," bound hand and foot in a cart, condemned and hopeless, beyond the reach of brachystochrone or the functions of Laplace.

Arrived at the campus, where the sacrificial fires were burning blue upon the altar, and Chinese dead-lights hung from the trees, the assembled multitude listened to a harrowing poem from the haruspex Jenkins, and to an astrological harangue from the carnifex Ward. When this last was ended, the goat was placed upon the altar that the carnifex might slay it and look in it for omens, it being rightly thought that the mixed diet affected by that animal made its interior a likely place to search in. It was done, and although the victim appeared to have recently surfeited on sawdust, enough was found in it to settle the doom of "Legendre." He was promptly executed, and his remains strewn over the campus. "Nunc," said the haruspex; "est beerum bibendum, nunc pede libero, pulsanda floorum!" Whereupon they all adjourned to the American Institute Hall, where with beer and things a highly proper and festive time was had of it.
